Conservation update: Bulbourne project and Gadespring

The project to improve the river Bulbourne where it flows through Box Moor Trust land has attracted yet another accolade, being commended in the 'Natural Environment' category of the Canal and River Trust Living Waterways Awards 2018. The positive impact that the work has had on the river and its environs is becoming ever clearer, with ecological monitoring providing evidence of an increase in the numbers and species of fish and invertebrates, as well as regular sightings of water-loving mammals and wetland birds. We were contacted by local resident Alice Vesty, who photographed one such bird on Hardings Moor in October. Alice said, "I was pleasantly surprised to spot what I'm pretty sure was a snipe down on the moor earlier. The changes that the Box Moor Trust have made down there really are wonderful."

It has been exciting to record the first sightings of otters locally for more than 50 years, although this was tempered by the sad news that one of them is now in Tiggywinkles Wildlife Hospital recovering from a dog attack. In addition, the bird hide



at Gadespring continues to afford sightings of uncommon species in recent months, including a sedge warbler, a spotted fly catcher and this jack snipe, photographed by Trust conservation volunteer Clive Tomlinson.

Consultation: proposed deregistration and exchange of common land

Fast changing circumstances are bringing a significant risk to the Trust's regular income stream. For the Trust to continue protecting the land and offering services to the growing community, it is essential that it seeks new ways to fund itself sustainably. Consequently, the Trust proposes to deregister a small part of its estate for development, and in exchange it will offer an alternative plot as protected common land. We need to carry out a local consultation to ask for your views before applying to the National Planning Inspectorate for what is known as a 'deregistration' of common land. Your views really matter, and to demonstrate a fair and independent assessment of the feedback, we have employed specialist consultants.

The financial sustainability of the Trust's work and services in the future will depend on the results, so your response of support

could be absolutely key. It is very important that we get your feedback and you can do this online at www.boxmoortrust.org. uk. If you can't get online, you can provide feedback by filling out a paper form and sending it directly to our independent consultants via a pre-paid envelope. A leaflet, set of FAQs and an accompanying questionnaire are being distributed at Hemel Hempstead and Bovingdon libraries, Marlowes - Hemel Hempstead Information Centre, Apsley Community Centre and St. Mary's Church. They are also available at the Box Moor Trust Office. Alternatively, if you ring us on 01442 253300 we can send you a copy by post. A public notice has been placed in the Gazette. After this consultation there will also be the opportunity to make a 'representation' in February, either in support or against, to the Secretary of State. Details will be available later.

Students from Dacorum Education Support Centre (DESC), an organisation that works with young people outside mainstream education, learned team building, construction and gardening skills as part of a wider "Outside Project". Thanks to a £2,500 grant awarded to DESC by the Box Moor Trust in 2016, the school in Grovehill was able to kick start their outdoor space project. Students were involved from

the start such as researching ideas and ordering materials.

The project saw students and staff building benches and vegetable beds, as well as erecting a greenhouse and a shed. The greenhouse is now in regular use for planting cuttings and sowing seeds. Students have been learning about horticulture and have successfully grown vegetables such as beetroot, runner beans, tomatoes and marrows. The outdoor space has also been used for presentations and events such as the Year 11 end of year BBQ.


The Outside Project is ongoing and DESC have plans to create a pond, more seating and further facilities to enable them to run a horticulture course.
