## Trustee Election 2025 Are 'Ewe' Voting?

**This October, the Box Moor Trust is inviting you to help shape the future of our cherished open spaces by voting in the Trustee Election.**

If you are registered on the electoral roll and live in Hemel Hempstead or Bovingdon (our Area of Benefit), you're eligible—and it's easy to vote!

### How, where and why?

Voting opens at 8am on Wednesday 8th October 2025 and closes at 8pm on Wednesday 15th October 2025. Voting will take place online and at the polling station at Box Moor Trust Centre in London Road, HP1 2RE.

#### To vote online

You will need to pre-register on our website at: [www.boxmoortrust.org.uk/trustee-election-2025/](http://www.boxmoortrust.org.uk/trustee-election-2025/). Registration will be open until 1st October 2025.

#### To vote in person

You will need to bring with you photo ID showing your address – see the website for details of acceptable documentation.

Trustees guide how the estate is managed, from preserving wildlife habitats to running community events and setting strategy. The Box Moor Trust is governed by a Board of up to 12 Trustees, and there are four vacancies on the Board. Ten candidates are standing for election, and you can vote for up to four of those. 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## A helping hand for nature from Henkel Ltd

In July, we were delighted to welcome a group of eight volunteers from Henkel Ltd, who came to help our environmental team at Pixies Mere in Pix Farm Lane. The Trust is working to restore the ecological value of the site and improve it for nature. The Henkel volunteers worked alongside our Environmental and Community rangers, Heather and Mike, to stake in hazel faggots at the lake edge. Pre-planted coir rolls were then installed on top, which should quickly establish to provide a natural plant fringe (reed, yellow flag, iris, etc). The aim is to attract insects, dragonflies, damselflies, etc. The volunteers also took a vegetation raft out onto the lake, which will provide welcome surface cover for wildlife. ## A beautiful visitor

**This beautiful Willow Emerald damselfly was photographed for the first time at Gadespring in mid-August by Trust volunteer Dave Finlayson. The males can be very obliging for photographers as they can perch for long periods in full sight, but it takes patience to get an image this clear.**

This species, which is noted for its white wing tip spots and angled wings, has a remarkable story. It is dominant in parts of Europe but started to colonise our southeast coastal areas for the first time in 2009.

The female lays eggs under the bark of 1 cm thick willow branches just above the water. The eggs grow over the winter, and the first nymph instar breaks out and drops into the water in the spring. If branches show lots of equal sized pimples this may be evidence of their presence.

Whilst most damselfly and dragonfly nymphs take 1 to 5 years to mature to adulthood and are exciting to see for those who attend pond dipping sessions, this damselfly can be flying a few weeks after the egg hatches. This speed, along with a succession of mild winters, has allowed them to spread quickly away from the coast. The first one recorded in Herts was in 2015. 10 years later it has found its way to Gadespring and it is already being identified inland right across the southeast and up to Yorkshire. Sometimes new arrivals from the continent are harbingers of a warming climate or are not welcome, such as the Box Moth or Asian Hornet, but this beautiful damselfly, which likes good quality water, is surely a welcome arrival to our ponds and lakes.

## Footpath improvements at Westbrook Hay

If you walk regularly at Westbrook Hay, you will have seen that we are in the process of upgrading the footpaths and walkways. This is to improve access for our beneficiaries, especially at those times of the year when the existing pathways are liable to become very wet and muddy. Of necessity, this has meant that routes and permissive bridleways have occasionally had to be temporarily closed while heavy machinery is operating on the site.
