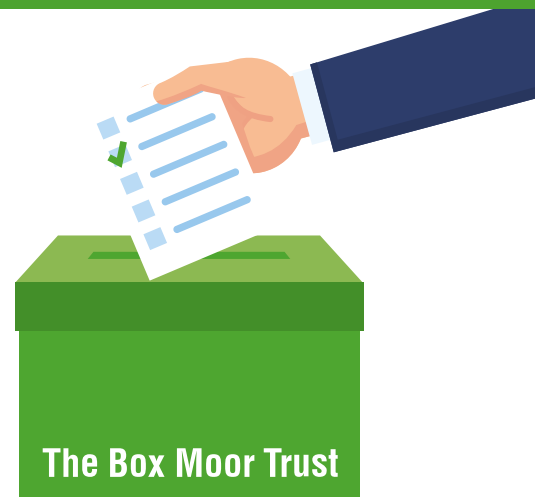
We simply couldn't do what we do without amazing volunteers like them.

## Regenerative Felling at Upper Roughdown

The Box Moor Trust is committed to responsible woodland management and works in close partnership with the Forestry Commission to ensure all activities follow best practice and national guidance. Following thorough consultation and in alignment with Forestry Commission recommendations, we will begin regenerative tree felling works at Upper Roughdown in January 2026.

These essential works are being undertaken in response to the declining health of trees in this area mainly due to the effects of Ash Dieback. Proactive intervention is necessary

to protect public safety and support the long-term health of the woodland ecosystem. While these works will result in a noticeable transformation of the landscape, they are part of a broader strategy to regenerate and restore the woodland. Over time, this will encourage natural regeneration, improve biodiversity, and create a more resilient woodland for future generations.

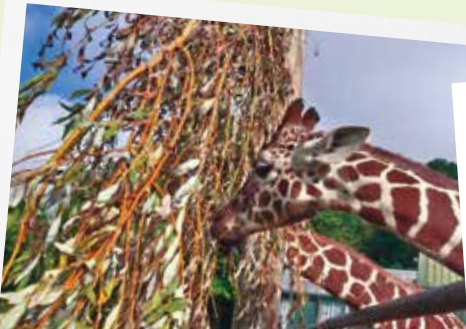
## A Special Treat for Whipsnade Zoo

Over the last few months, we've been donating all the willow we collect during our habitat management work to Whipsnade Zoo, who have had a shortage of food for their rhinos and giraffes. The team there have kindly shared some lovely photos of the animals enjoying their tasty treats — and we couldn't resist sharing them with you too!

The willow has come primarily from the old cress beds at Gadespring wetland reserve. With nesting season over, our volunteers were able to access the kingfisher bank area and give the willow a much-

needed cutback before it takes over and turns wetland into woodland. It's wonderful to see our habitat work not only benefiting local wildlife but also bringing a little extra joy (and enrichment) to the amazing animals at Whipsnade. ## Barn owl box update

Our barn owl box is looking great this season, and we're excited to share that it continues to provide a safe, sheltered space for these incredible birds.

Barn owls are a treasured part of our local wildlife, and providing secure nesting sites helps support their population across the estate. We'll keep monitoring the box carefully and will share any new activity as soon as we spot it. Stay tuned for more updates—and keep your eyes (and ears!) open during evening walks, you might just glimpse a barn owl hunting over the meadows.

Just a reminder that Gadespring, our 4-acre former watercress farm off Old Fishery Lane, is open to visit on regular days during the year. These volunteer-led events are free to attend and take place every Thursday morning (10am – midday) and on the last Sunday of the month (11am – 2pm).

## Dog attack on livestock

**Sadly, in November one of our goats at Bovingdon Brickworks was injured in a dog attack and required veterinary treatment.**

These incidents are deeply distressing and cause unnecessary suffering to our animals. We're asking all dog owners to please keep dogs on leads around livestock and be vigilant when walking near grazing
